Rabies diagnostic testing on weekends and holidays

Rabies diagnostic testing of animals that are suspected to have exposed a human or animal to rabies is a medical urgency, not a medical emergency. Exposures include bites or scratches; or open wounds or mucous membrane contact with saliva/infected tissues from the suspect animal.

Requests for rabies diagnostic testing on weekends or holiday should be directed to the local health department to determine the need to call in a rabies diagnostician to perform the testing during off-hours. The local health department should consult with the state department of health. As a secondary option, notify the rabies diagnostician or Rabies Laboratory Director to coordinate the case evaluation (contact the **Emergency Desk at (785) 532-5690** to reach the rabies diagnostician or lab director).

Generally cases to be under consideration for emergency testing will include:

- Bite exposure.
- Suspect animal is clinically ill with no history of prior vaccination and has signs consistent with rabies infection.
- The health department or other health provider has been contacted and is ready to administer PEP if the result of testing is positive.
